History of the event	World AIDS Day was established in 1988 by the World Health Organization (WHO) to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS and honor those who have died from the disease. The day is observed annually on December 1
Significance of the event	World AIDS Day is an opportunity for every community and individual to honor the more than 32 million people who have died worldwide from AIDS-related illness. December 1 is a day for voices to unite by sharing experiences, remembering those lost, and standing together in the fight against HIV.
